The role and importance of Religious Studies at Saint Cecilia's

Religious Studies is an important and valued subject at Saint Cecilia's because it is a unique academic subject that provokes challenging questions about the ultimate meaning and purpose of life, allows learners to explore beliefs about God, the self and the nature of reality. It encourages young people to reflect on the issues of right and wrong and what it means to be human. It develops students' knowledge and understanding of Christianity, other principal religions and worldviews. It offers opportunities for personal reflection and spiritual development.

This approach to Religious Studies finds its foundation in the verse John 10:10. This scripture motivates RS teachers in their commitment to equipping learners with skills and creating opportunities to live abundant lives not only during their time at St Cecilia's but also well beyond their graduation day. Aligned with the school's overarching vision, the RS department strives to fulfil this objective through a dedicated focus on nurturing the love of learning, aspiration, integrity, compassion and appreciation of different cultures, religions and worldviews. This approach ensures that Religious Studies is accessible to learners from diverse backgrounds and provides support for individuals with varying needs.

Religious Studies is a valued core subject across Key Stages. Religious Studies contributes to breadth and depth of understanding of other subjects, particularly English, History, Science and Geography as it provides cultural and religious context and prompts learners to explore philosophical and ethical dimensions of the subjects they study. Moreover, it encourages learners to develop analytical and critical thinking skills.

Religious Education is a core subject which all students pursue at GCSE level. Students can continue to study religious, philosophical and ethical issues and theories in the A Level Religious Studies (Philosophy, Ethics and Theology).

Curriculum Key Stage 3

Key Stage 3 curriculum is planned to provide learners with a strong foundation as they advance in their education and to develop curiosity, love of learning and appreciation of different religions and worldviews. This goal is achieved by following the principles outlined in 'Religious Education in Church of England A: Statement of Entitlement' and Southwark Diocese Educational Board guidance on balanced curriculum. Such an approach reflects the complex nature of RS as an academic subject and encourages learners to engage with religions through philosophy, theology and sociology. Majority of the curriculum time is spent studying Christianity and units were developed using high quality resources such as Understanding Christianity and Critical RE pedagogy.

In Year 7 and 9, pupils have four lessons per fortnight and three lessons per fortnight in Year 8. Pupils study the following topics:

Is it possible to prove that God exists?*

In this unit, pupils study religious arguments for God's existence, such as design argument, cosmological argument and argument from religious experience. They also examine non-religious responses to the arguments and are encouraged to form their own responses to the question whether we can prove the existence of God.

Can Buddhist teachings

explain why we suffer?
This unit gives pupils an opportunity to explore a religious response to the

religious response to the question of why people suffer. Pupils consider Buddha philosophy and teachings about suffering and evaluate how helpful they are to people living in a modern-day Britain.

How do we make moral decisions?*

This unit introduces pupils to ethics and different ways to make moral decisions. In this unit, learners explore different religious teachings as well as ethical approaches that some people use to solve moral dilemmas.

What does Islam teach about life in society?

This unit builds on the knowledge acquired in Year 7, which focused on the core beliefs in Islam. In this unit, pupils explore different groups within Islam and are encouraged to recognise the impact of history and context on these groups and study the legal systems and beliefs underpinning Shari'ah law.

Marriage and the Family*

This unit allows pupils to study key Christian beliefs about the value of the family. It explores religious and non-religious responses to the questions surrounding the importance of marriage, sexual relationship, divorce. Pupils also are given the opportunity to explore how the local church supports families.

Christian Beliefs*

In this unit, pupils study key theological topics that include the Trinity, Creation and Salvation. They also explore the philosophical problem of evil and evaluate different solutions offered to it.

Living the Jewish Life

In this unit, pupils are introduced to the key religious practices and traditions within Judaism. Pupils learn about the history and traditions of key Jewish festivals. This unit aims to introduce pupils to the Jewish culture though real-life examples and religious artefacts.

Curriculum Key Stage 4

Year 10 and Year 11 students receive three lessons per fortnight in RS. During Key Stage 4 pupils study Edexcel Religious Studies B syllabus. The GCSE is assessed by two 1 hour 45-minute exams at the end of Year 11. The course consists of theological and thematic studies from a Christian and Jewish perspective.

Curriculum Key Stage 5

Core Religious Studies

Core Key Stage 5 Religious Studies provision is delivered as an explicit part of PSHE curriculum. In Year 12, students complete an EPQ-style research project relating to their interests during which they explore a philosophical, ethical or theological dimension of their chosen topic. In Year 13, students examine the influence of Christianity on culture on religious practice around the world.

A Level Course

Students who choose to pursue A Level Religious Studies (Philosophy, Ethics and Theology) study the OCR Religious Studies course. This course is split into three units, Philosophy of Religious Ethics and Developments in Christian Thought. It is examined by three essay-based exams at the end of Year 13.

Enrichment and extra-curricular

We invite pupils to take part in a range of enriching experiences at our school. Key Stage 3 pupils are encouraged to engage in deep philosophical conversations by attending our fortnightly Philosophy Club. They can explore thought-provoking films and documentaries in our weekly Lunchtime Documentary and Film Club. Beyond the classroom, we offer educational trips that complement your in-class learning. For example, Year 8 students explore the Buddhapadipa Temple, Year 9s engage with the Wimbledon Synagogue, and A Level students benefit from university-style Philosophy and Ethics lectures at a yearly A Level conference. Additionally, pupils and students often benefit from the visits of distinguished guest speakers. Sixth form students had the privilege of meeting Archdeacon Kiddle, while Year 9s participated in an event led by Bishop Cheetham.

Religious Education provides students with a range of skills which are transferable to a number of different A Levels and degree subjects. The subject encourages students to think critically, analyse texts and develop arguments. These are essential skills within all humanities and social sciences subjects.
