Rub each balloon onto your hair or onto woollen fabric. This adds electrons to the balloon and causes the balloon to become negatively charged. At the end of last term, all Sixth Form students enjoyed a fun Easter egg hunt in school and out in the Peace Garden.










Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

Over the past few weeks, Year 8 students have been thinking about ethics, discussing topics like animal importance, ethics of AI, what makes us human, and whether an action is moral, based on if it produces happiness. Their insightful discussions reflect strong critical thinking skills. Next, they will begin working on a group project exploring moral decision-making where they will deepen their understanding of ethics.



Here are some questions to spark meaningful conversations at home:

- 1. Should animals have the same rights as humans?
- 2. What are the ethical implications of developing advanced artificial intelligence (AI)? Should AI have rights and responsibilities?
- 3. Do humans possess any value beyond our physical existence?
- 4. Can actions that bring us happiness always be considered morally right? How do we differentiate between short-term pleasure and long-term well-being?
- 5. How do we make moral decisions as individuals and as a society? What factors influence our ethical choices?

Duke Of Edinburgh's Award

As we prepare for the upcoming Duke of Edinburgh's expeditions, it's essential to ensure our Bronze and Silver participants are well-prepared. Firstly, please remind your child to complete their kit checklist, detailing what they have and what they still need. Additionally, pupils have the option to rent a Trangia stove for their group, requiring a £10 deposit which is refundable upon its return in good condition. Coordination within groups regarding tent/sleeping arrangements and other equipment is vital, so encourage your child to communicate with their team. Also, they need to start thinking of meal ideas for the expedition. Remind your child to stay informed by checking the noticeboard in the art corridor for updates regularly.
