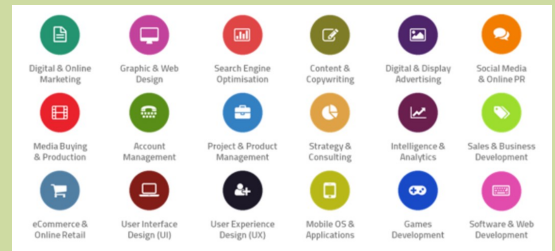
National Careers Week

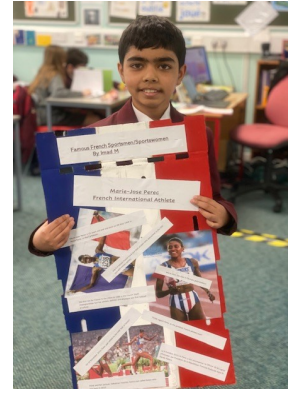

Materials Behaving Badly!

Is it a solid? Is it a liquid? In this practical, Year 7 pupils produced a non-Newtonian fluid, very similar to Oobleck, to investigate how this substance doesn't play by the rules! This suspension only behaves like a fluid some of the time. It has variable viscosity dependent on stress, which means that if you strike it quickly, it solidifies and exhibits the properties of a solid.

Duke Of Edinburgh Progress

We are thrilled that pupils working towards their Bronze and Silver Duke of Edinburgh awards have successfully completed their first aid training. Throughout the sessions, they learned vital skills such as the recovery position, CPR, emergency procedures, burn treatment and the proper use of an EpiPen. We are immensely proud of how well they engaged with the training, demonstrating a serious commitment to their learning and preparedness. These skills are invaluable, not only for their upcoming expeditions, but also for life beyond the classroom.



We encourage you to discuss with your child the importance of these first aid skills at home and how they can be applied in various situations before they complete their expedition. To keep the pupils informed about future training sessions, we will be posting notices on the notice board in the art corridor and announcing them during assemblies. All children completing Bronze or Silver DofE must take full responsibility for their award by checking the notice board and coming to see us if they have any concerns or questions about DofE.

In a fusion of language and wellness, Year 9 pupils learnt about healthy habits through dynamic activities in their Spanish language classes.

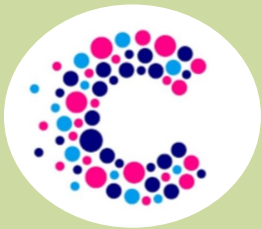

BTEC Fundraiser for Cancer Research UK



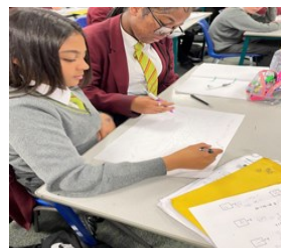
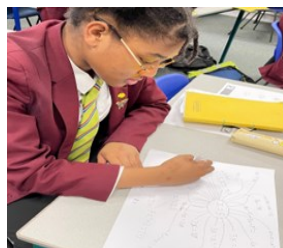

Year 8 Create Algebraic Equations

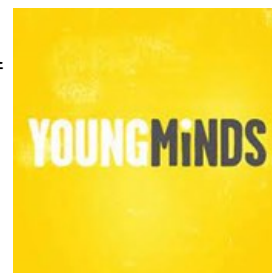
Year 9 pupils completed some amazing work on creating algebraic equations during maths lessons this week. As you can see from the photos, they gave their full concentration and were focused throughout!

Impressive Fundraising from Non-Uniform Day

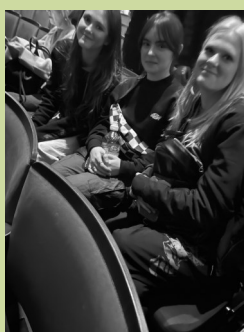
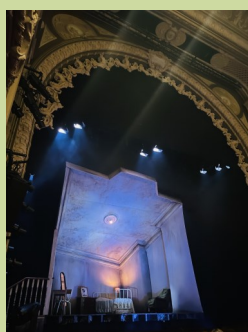
Thank you to all parents and carers who supported our recent non-uniform day in aid of Young Minds. We were able to donate a fantastic £1,053 to this very worthy cause.

Table Talk: topics and questions from Religious Studies

Year 8 pupils are learning about ethics. They are starting to wonder where ideas about morality come from. Pupils considered different ethical dilemmas and responded in a variety of ways. For example, some thought killing was always wrong whereas others thought certain circumstances justified the act.

To think further about why people have different views on what is right and wrong, use the following questions to consider where your sense of morality has come from:

- What role do you think family upbringing plays in shaping our ethical beliefs?
- How much influence do you think society and culture have on our understanding of what is right and wrong?
- Do you think social media influences your opinion on what is moral?
- What do you think has the biggest impact on most peoples' sense of right and wrong in 2024?
